

Recommended Training

 Level 3 adult safeguarding; Over a 3 year period, professionals at level 3 should receive refresher training equivalent to a minimum of 8 hours.

 Level 3 child safeguarding; 8 hours for level 3 core knowledge but 12 hours for those requiring role specific additional knowledge (including GPs)



Level 3/3+ can be achieved through any of;

Face to face training sessions

eLearning courses

Review of critical incidents

Practice meetings

Peer discussions

Case reviews/discussions

TV documentaries/news articles (as long as some discussion and reflection)

Should include some multidisciplinary and scenario based discussion

- Maintaining and Updating Competences

RCGP 'need to be compliant in adult safeguarding at level 3, but as this is a new recommendation it is recognised that these are not yet widely available. The knowledge of adult safeguarding can still be done through reading and any encounters with patients where safeguarding has been a concern. It is not expected for you to pay personally for a commercial level 3 adult safeguarding course'

4 cases to discuss.

Discuss in small groups

 Case based group discussion so counts towards Level 3 safeguarding training for both adult and child safeguarding (can double count)

What themes can be identified from the cases?



- Past hx of abuse
- Known to services-GP, social services, police
- Chronic pain/addictive medication
- Children not a protective factor
- Services involved after release from prison? Child protection
- Ending relationship-big risk



- Teenage mum
- Known to services
- Complex history mental health? Drug?
- Homelessness
- (toxic trio-DA, substance, mental health)
- Pregnancy
- Ending a relationship



- Son concerned about the way mum was treated ?coercive control
- Mental health issues
- Man in crisis
- Ending a relationship
- Not known to services
- Kids not a protective factor



- Previous history of violence
- Reported to police by family members
- Known to police for previous cases
- Coercive control



Themes in abuse cases;

- None of these were "out of the blue".
- Male perpetrators.
- Known to Services.
- Threat of Separation.
- Loss of home.
- Children abused as well.
- Drugs and Alcohol.
- Mental Health Problems.
- Coercion/Control.
- Family Concerns
- Female remaining in an abusive relationship.
- Past history of abuse.
- Trigger Point threats of ending relationship -? opportunity for "safety-netting"?



Relationship breakdown

• Including the time leading up to the separation presents the greatest risk to both the victim and other family members, with the maximum risk being at the time of separation and 6 weeks after



Men Presenting in Crisis

 In general, Males are far more likely to be the perpetrators than females.

 Remember the "Toxic Trio" (Mental Health; Drugs and Alcohol; Domestic Abuse) – Remember they also represent a risk to <u>others</u>, not only themselves.



Family Members

Children and other family members are <u>NOT</u> a protective factor.



Ethnicity/Culture

• NOT a theme from these cases, but this can be a barrier to disclosure.



Section 76 of the Serious Crime Act 2015 created a new offence of controlling or coercive behaviour in an intimate or family relationship



Coercive control is when a person with whom you are **personally connected**, repeatedly behaves in a way which makes you feel controlled, dependent, isolated or scared.

- isolating you from your friends and family
- controlling how much money you have and how you spend it
- monitoring your activities and your movements
- •repeatedly putting you down, calling you names or telling you that you are worthless
- threatening to harm or kill you or your child
- •threatening to publish information about you or to report you to the police or the authorities
- damaging your property or household goods
- •forcing you to take part in criminal activity or child abuse



Coercive control

• Difficult to spot, for both Victims (through distorted perspective) and Services BUT can indicate a <u>HIGH</u> risk of DA once separation, or threat of separation is added.

• Also, Coercive Control is <u>MORE</u> of an indicator of risk than a Hx of Physical Violence.

- Depression, Anxiety, PTSD, or history of these

RCGP Course

 Core information is delivered through a presentation, which includes interactivity and group discussion. There is one each of these for adult and child safeguarding. Following completion of this 30 minute session, a further 30 minutes of guided self-directed group work is available for download. By completing both of these, and using the guide on reflective practice, all competency criteria for level 3 adult safeguarding can be met. This will enable you to get the most out of the remainder of the minimum eight hours of level 3 learning which is required every three years.
